WASHINGTON D.C

The nation's capitol and its surrounding areas contain a tremendous amount of interesting things to see, some historical, others just beautiful. There is so much to do and see in D.C. that you could spend a week there and not cover everything. It is a place for everyone to enjoy and learn, no matter who you are or where you are from.

Washington D.C. is a good place to visit year round, with the exception of a few weeks in the dead of winter or a heatwave in summer. If you hit bad weather conditions, you can spend extra time indoors at the many fine museums and cultural attractions.

A good place to begin your tour of D.C. is at the Washington Monument located in the center of the Mall. The Mall is a long park extending from the Capitol building on the Bast side to the Lincoln Memorial on the West. Take an elevator ride to the top for a terrific view of the city from 500 feet above ground level. Or you can walk up if you've been using the leg press machine at the gym regularly - take the elevator, though!!

Back at the foot of the Monument, start walking West towards the Lincoln Memorial. About halfway there, cut across the lawn to your right and you'll pass by a small lake. After surveying the lake and its surrounding beauties, you'll encounter the Vietnam War Memorial, where the names of those who gave their lives are inscribed. There are two walls, each so clean and shiny you can see yourself reflected in them.

Next, continue on to the Lincoln Memorial, one of the most beautiful pure Grecian buildings in the world. Climb up the steps to the platform and look back, for a wonderful view of the Washington Monument, the Capitol building and the reflecting pool. Inside you will find the famous statue of Abraham Lincoln, familiar to all of us from the Lincoln penny - honest!! If you examine the back of a penny carefully, you can actually see the statue!

Now walk Bast towards the Capitol building. You will pass by several of the buildings that make up the Smithsonian Institution (and please note its name: not The Smithsonian Institute). You'll want to spend time inside these buildings no matter what your interests are, but if the weather is good, save that part until your outdoor sight-seeing is done.

Walk down to Pennsylvania Avenue and head towards the White House. When you get to 10th Street, you'll find yourself in front of Ford's Theatre, the very place where, on April 14, 1865, during the third act of a comedy called Our American Cousin, John Wilkes Booth fatally shot President Lincoln. Although mortally wounded, Mr. Lincoln lived long enough to be carried across the street to a nearby home, dying there the following day.

Guided tours of the White House usually available Tuesdays through Saturdays. If you don't want to wait in long lines, you can walk around behind the heavily guarded mansion for a nice view though the fence. Please don't try to imitate President Pord's sexy son Jack and climb over it - or your visit in D.C. will be longer than you anticipated!!

There are so many things to do and see that I would need a couple of extra pages. Other favorites: Supreme Court Building, Library of Congress, the Jefferson, Lyndon B. Johnson, and John Paul Jones memorials, and Washington Art Gallery. You'll run across many places to get information about D.C. Make sure to explore the many buildings of the Smithsonian Institution, which has the best collections of just about anything you can imagine!!

Let's get down to the nitty gritty: for the gay/lesbian tourist visiting D.C., there's plenty of places to go that are of special interest. The Dupont Circle, located in the Northwest part of the city, is simular to Castro Street in San Francisco, only to a much smaller degree. It has a nice variety of bookstores, restaurants, bars (some with completely nude male strippers), guest houses, retail shops, and many more.

As in any large city, you have some bad neighborhoods and some bad people in the good neighborhoods. The capital's futuristic subways provide convenient access to all sections of the city.

WORLD STAMP EXPO '89

WORLD STAMP EXPO '89, the first stamp show directly sponsored by the United States Postal Service, will be held in the Washington D.C. Convention Center, located between 9th and 11th Streets and H Street and New York Avenue, less than one mile east-northeast of the White House.

The show dates will be November 17-20, and November 24 through December 3, 1989. The event will be closed November 21 through November 23, Thanksgiving, our national holiday. Exhibition hours each day will be from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

The 14-day stamp show will be divided into four segments:

"Mail Deliver of the Past"
"Mail Delivery of the Future"
"Postal Stationery"
"Youth Philately"

Representatives from 126 foreign postal administrations will join 137 stamp dealers, auctioneers, publishers and accessory dealers. Credit cards and personal checks, of course cash too, are always dealers' best friend.

First Day enthusiasts will have a field day at WORLD STAMP EXPO '89 with eleven ceremonies planned for U.S. stamp and postal stationery and several foreign first days. Special cancellations also will be abundant during the show.

Alexander von Humboldt and Aimé Bonpland explored South America together. Published correspondence revealed an intimacy between the two explorers.




Justus von Liebig "We found, understood, loved and will forever love each other" (Platen's diary)

Michelangelo Buonarroti's most admired sculpture is his 'David. The love sonnets he wrote to his male lovers were altered upon publication, to read as if written to women.

Raphael Santi. The 'Divine Painter' chose two of his apprentices, Romano and Penni, as his personal house guests. Upon the death of Raphael, both men shared equally in his estate.

Caravaggio's ability to capture the seductive moods of his male models, brought him fame among his gay clientele.



Marcel Proust's love for his chauffeur was broken by the news that Alfred, while on a solo flight, crashed and perished at sea.



Thomas Mann's diaries reveal tender feelings for his wife and children as well as an overpowering homosexual inclination.



Federico Garcia Lorca was brutally murdered by fascist civil guardsmen who despised his political views and his homosexuality.

COMPOSERS & MUSICIANS





Mistakenly thinking that marriage would bring an end to his homosexual feelings, Peter Ilich Tchaikovsky proposed to Antonina Milyukova. This disastrous union drove him to the verge of suicide.

Contemporaries of <u>Camille Saint-Saens</u> reported that this brilliant pianist, and composer, chose his male companions indiscreetly.







ECVARD GRIEG (Norway) S PERCY GRAINGER (Australia)

Edvard Grieg, devoted husband of Nina Hagerup, late in life became infatuated with Australian concert pianist Percy Grainger, of whom Grieg wrote lovingly in his journals.

Impresario Serge Diaghilev and dancer Vaslav Nijinsky loved, quarreled and parted. Diaghilev wooed other male dancers. Nijinsky married, lost fame and became mentally deranged.

Charles Laughton in 'Mutiny on the Bounty'

Actor <u>Charles Laughton</u> admitted to his wife, Elsa Lanchester, that he had a homosexual streak in him. Elsa later wrote, "If I had known all this before we were married it might have been different...The deception is what hurt so deeply."







Movie idol $\underline{\text{Rock Hudson}}$ emerged from the closet with an announcement from a Paris hospital that he had been diagnosed as having AIDS.

Entertainer $\underline{\text{Wladziu Valentino Liberace}}$ denied being homosexual. He died of complications from AIDS on February 4, 1987.

GAY & LESBIAN HISTORY ON STAMPS CLUB

Gay and Lesbian History on Stamps (GLHS), is a study unit of the American Topical Association devoted to lesbian and gay history and culture as illustrated on stamps of the world. The subjects of the study unit include men and women (and their works) for whom historical evidence exists of homosexual or bisexual behavior or orientation, historical events or ideas (such as laws) significant in the history of gay culture, myths and folklore concerning homosexuality, and animal species which show prominent homosexual behavior.


In the spring of 1982, collectors met to discuss the formation of a gay and lesbian stamp club, whose purpose was to bring together gay philatelists, to publish a quarterly journal, to put together a gay handbook utilizing Scott ca:alog numbers, and to further knowledge of gay heritage through philately. The study unit was formed, and has been active since.

Gay and Lesbian History on Stamps Club has published the Lambda Philatelic Journal since the summer of 1982. GLHSC became a study unit of the American Topical Association on June 20, 1985. Ed Centeno is the current President. For further information on this organization please send SASE
